Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby requested to notify and warn the voters of the Town of Skowhegan in said County and State, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet in the **Opera House in the Skowhegan Municipal Building**, in said Town on Saturday, the fifth day of June, A.D., 2021 at ten o'clock in the morning, to transact all business as herein enumerated in the articles of the Town Warrant.

And, to notify and warn said voters to meet in the **Council Room in the Skowhegan Municipal Building** in said Town, on Tuesday, the eight day of June, A.D., 2021, then and there to act upon Article 2 by secret ballot as set out below, the polling hours therefore to be from 7:00 A.M. to 8:00 P.M.

ARTICLE 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

ARTICLE 2. To choose, by ballot, the following Town Officials, namely, Two Selectmen, for three-year terms; One Road Commissioner, for a three-year term; One Town Clerk, for a three-year term; One Town Treasurer, for a three-year term; One Assessor, for a three-year term; One Overseer of the Poor, for a three-year term; Two Park Commissioners, for five-year terms; and Four Directors of RSU54/SAD54, for three-year terms.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,828,889.00 for General Government.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$896,281.00 for Solid Waste and Recycling. (The Selectmen with a 5/0 vote and the Budget Committee with a 6/0 vote recommend passage of this article.)

ARTICLE 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$602,378.00 for Public Works – Summer Roads Maintenance. (The Selectmen with a 5/0 vote and the Budget Committee with a 7/0 vote recommend passage of this article.)

ARTICLE 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40,000.00 for Capital Expenditures/Capital Reserve Funds for the Municipal Building. (The Selectmen with a 5/0 vote and the Budget Committee with a 7/0 vote recommend passage of this article.)

ARTICLE 19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$47,000.00 for Capital Expenditures/Capital Reserve Funds for the Solid Waste Department. (The Selectmen with a 5/0 vote and the Budget Committee with a 5/1 vote recommend passage of this article.)

ARTICLE 20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$67,400.00 for Capital Expenditures/Capital Reserve Funds for the Police Department. (The Selectmen with a 5/0 vote and the Budget Committee with a 7/0 vote recommend passage of this article.)

ARTICLE 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200,000.00 for Capital Expenditures/Capital Reserve Funds for Public Works Equipment. (The Selectmen with a 5/0 vote and the Budget Committee with a 7/0 vote recommend passage of this article.)

ARTICLE 22. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$770,000.00 for Capital Expenditures/Capital Reserve Funds for Public Works Roads and Sidewalks. (The Selectmen with a 5/0 vote and the Budget Committee with a 7/0 vote recommend passage of this article.)

ARTICLE 23. To see if the town will vote to accept and carry forward in a separate account sums that may be received from the State Department of Transportation Local Road Assistance Program estimated at \$139,664.00. (The Selectmen with a 5/0 vote and the Budget Committee with a 7/0 vote recommend passage of this article.)

ARTICLE 24. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to expend the amounts voted in Articles 22 and 23 from the Capital Improvement Program/Public Works Roads and Sidewalks account for the town's share of the following proposed projects: Paving/work planned for Eaton Mountain Road, Bigelow Hill Road, Burrill Hill Road, Beech Street, Hanover Street, Crescent Street, Lambert Road, Kennebec Street, Mitchell Street, Riverside Parking Lot, and Jewett Street. (The Selectmen recommend passage of this article.)

ARTICLE 25. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$242,000.00 for Capital Expenditures/Capital Reserve Funds for the Fire Department. (The Selectmen with a 5/0 vote and the Budget Committee with a 6/0 vote recommend passage of this article.)

ARTICLE 26. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for Capital Expenditures/Capital Reserve Funds for Emergency Management. (The Selectmen with a 5/0 vote and the Budget Committee with a 6/0 vote recommend passage of this article.)

ARTICLE 27. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000.00 for Capital Expenditures/Capital Reserve Funds for Administration. (The Selectmen with a 5/0 vote and the Budget Committee with a 7/0 vote recommend passage of this article.)

ARTICLE 28. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 for Capital Expenditures/Capital Reserve Funds for Assessing. (The Selectmen with a 5/0 vote and the Budget Committee with a 7/0 vote recommend passage of this article.)

ARTICLE 29. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,660.00 for Capital Expenditures/Capital Reserve Funds for Economic & Community Development. (The Selectmen with a 5/0 vote and the Budget Committee with a 6/1 vote recommend passage of this article.)

ARTICLE 30. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$41,000.00 for Capital Expenditures/Capital Reserve Funds for Cemeteries. (The Selectmen with a 5/0 vote and the Budget Committee with a 6/0 vote recommend passage of this article.)

ARTICLE 31. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00 for Capital Expenditures/Capital Reserve Funds for the Planning Department. (The Selectmen with a 5/0 vote and the Budget Committee with a 7/0 vote recommend passage of this article.)

ARTICLE 32. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000.00 for Capital Expenditures/Capital Reserve Funds for Public Works Buildings. (The Selectmen with a 3/2 vote recommend \$25,000.00 and the Budget Committee with a 6/1 vote recommends \$30,000.00.)

ARTICLE 33. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for Capital Expenditures/Capital Reserve Funds for Street Lights. (The Selectmen with a 5/0 vote and the Budget Committee with a 7/0 vote recommend passage of this article.)

Note: Organizations were informed that although the Town of Skowhegan does not require that petitions be filed in order to request funds, it is the only way to make sure that the requested amount appears on the Warrant. The Selectmen voted on October 23, 2018 to change the signature requirement on petitions for funding requests from 10% to 5% of voters from the last gubernatorial election. 164 signatures were required for funding request petitions this year.

ARTICLE 34. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$195,000.00 for Skowhegan Free Public Library. The Community Service Organization's request by petition was \$195,000.00. (The Selectmen with a 3/2 vote and the Budget Committee with a 6/0 vote recommend \$175,000.00.)

ARTICLE 35. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 for Coburn Park Commission. The Community Service Organization's request by petition is \$10,000.00. (The Selectmen with a 5/0 vote and the Budget Committee with a 6/0 vote recommend passage of this article.)

ARTICLE 36. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 for Skowhegan History House. The Community Service Organization's request by petition is \$10,000.00. (The Selectmen with a 5/0 vote and the Budget Committee with a 5/0/1 vote recommend passage of this article.)

ARTICLE 37. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$60,000.00 for Main Street Skowhegan. The Community Service Organization's request by petition is \$60,000.00. (The Selectmen with a 5/0 vote and the Budget Committee with a 6/0 vote recommend passage of this article.)

ARTICLE 38. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000.00 for Skowhegan Welcome & Business Center. The Community Service Organization's request by petition is \$30,000.00. (The Selectmen with a 5/0 vote and the Budget Committee with a 6/1 vote recommend \$24,000.00.)

ARTICLE 39. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 for Lake George Regional Park. The Community Service Organization's request by petition is \$15,000.00. (The Selectmen with a 4/1 vote and the Budget Committee with a 6/0 vote recommend passage of this article.)

ARTICLE 40. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,700.00 for KVCAP Transportation Services. The Human Service Agency's request by petition is \$3,700.00. (The Selectmen with a 5/0 vote and the Budget Committee with a 6/0 vote recommend passage of this article.)

ARTICLE 41. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000.00 for Family Violence Project. The Human Service Agency's request by petition is \$6,000.00. (The Selectmen with a 5/0 vote and the Budget Committee with a 6/0 vote recommend passage of this article.)

ARTICLE 42. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,420.00 for Spectrum Generations. The Human Service Agency's request by petition is \$8,420.00. (The Selectmen with a 5/0 vote and the Budget Committee with a 6/0 vote recommend passage of this article.)

ARTICLE 43. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000.00 for Hospice Volunteers of Somerset County. The Human Service Agency’s request by petition is \$20,000.00. (The Selectmen with a 5/0 vote recommend \$20,000.00 and the Budget Committee with a 4/2 vote recommends \$18,000.00.)

ARTICLE 44. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,007.00 for Sexual Assault Crisis & Support. The Human Service Agency’s request by petition is \$3,006.50. (The Selectmen with a 5/0 vote recommend \$3,007.00 and the Budget Committee with a 5/1 vote recommend \$0.00.)

ARTICLE 45. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$18,000.00 for Skowhegan Community Food Cupboard. The Human Service Agency’s request by petition is \$18,000.00. (The Selectmen with a 5/0 vote and the Budget Committee with a 6/0 vote recommend passage of this article.)

ARTICLE 46. To see if the Town will vote to apply FY 2022 operational revenues in the amount of \$2,496,527.00 to offset the FY 2022 appropriations. (The Selectmen with a 5/0 vote and the Budget Committee with a 6/0 vote recommend passage of this article.)

ARTICLE 47. To see if the town will vote to appropriate an amount from undesignated fund balance, not to exceed \$1,800,000.00, toward one or more of the following purposes:

- a. to appropriate funds to the Ballfield Compound Reserve Account;
- b. to reduce the tax commitment;
- c. to pay down debt faster.

(The Selectmen with a 5/0 vote recommend \$1,400,000.00 for the following:

- \$700,000.00 Ballfield Compound Reserve Account
- \$700,000.00 reduce the tax commitment

The Budget and Finance Committee with a 3/2 vote recommends \$1,800,000.00 for the following:

- \$800,000.00 Ballfield Compound Reserve Account
- \$500,000.00 reduce the tax commitment
- \$500,000.00 to pay down debt faster.

ARTICLE 48. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to transfer an amount not to exceed 1% of the total town budget between budget categories as they deem advisable to meet unanticipated expenses and emergencies that occur during fiscal year 2022. (The Selectmen recommend passage of this article.)

ARTICLE 49. To see if the Town will vote to establish September 15, 2021, or 30-days after the commitment date of taxes, whichever is later, as the date when the first installment of taxes shall be due and payable and March 15, 2022 as the date when the second installment of taxes shall be due and payable and to see if the Town will fix the rate of 6% interest to be charged on all taxes unpaid after said dates. (The Selectmen recommend passage of this article.)

ARTICLE 50. To see if the Town will vote, pursuant to 36 M.R.S.A. § 506-A to fix the rate of 2% interest to be paid on overpaid or abated taxes. (The Selectmen recommend passage of this article.)

ARTICLE 51. To see if the Town will vote to apply as much of the yearly overlay as may be necessary to fund property tax abatements and applicable interest granted during fiscal year 2022. (The Selectmen recommend passage of this article.)

ARTICLE 52. To see if the Town will vote, pursuant to 36 M.R.S.A. § 506, to authorize the tax collector and treasurer to accept the prepayment of taxes not yet committed. (The Selectmen recommend passage of this article.)

ARTICLE 53. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Tax Collector to enter into a standard agreement with year-round residential taxpayers establishing a “Tax Club” payment plan for property taxes, whereby: (1) the taxpayer agrees to pay specified monthly payments to the Town based on his/her estimated and actual tax obligation for current year property taxes; (2) the Town agrees not to charge interest or penalties on timely payments made pursuant to the tax club agreement; (3) the Town authorizes the Tax Collector to accept tax club payments for current taxes which may be due prior to the commitment of those taxes; (4) the agreement is automatically terminated if a scheduled payment is late, and the taxpayer then becomes subject to the same due dates and interest dates and rates as other taxpayers who are not participating in a tax club; (5) only taxpayers who do not have any outstanding tax obligation for prior tax years are eligible to participate in the tax club program; and (6) taxpayers wishing to participate in a tax club for a particular property tax year shall enter into agreement with the Town by a publicly-advertised deadline determined by the Tax Collector. (The Selectmen recommend passage of this article.)

ARTICLE 54. To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend, on behalf of the Town, grant funds from state government agencies, federal government agencies, or private organizations for any purpose they deem in the best interest of the Town. (The Selectmen recommend passage of this article.)

ARTICLE 55. To see if the Town, as the Legislative body will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen approving, applying for and accepting all Community Development Block Grants (CDBG), including the following:

- Community Enterprise Assistance Grant Program in the amount of \$100,000.00
- Economic Development Grant for Bigelow Brewing in the amount of \$270,000.00

and to make such assurances, assume such responsibilities and exercise such authority as are necessary and reasonable to implement such programs with the understanding that should the intended National Objective of the CDBG program not be met, all CDBG funds must be repaid to the State of Maine CDBG program. (The Selectmen recommend passage of this article.)

ARTICLE 56. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate all of the money received from the State for snowmobile registrations to the Skowhegan Sno-Hawks Snowmobile Club for the maintenance of their system or network of snowmobile trails, on the condition that those trails be open in snow season to the public for outdoor recreation purposes at no charge, and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to enter into an agreement with the Club, under such terms and conditions as the Board of Selectmen may deem advisable, for that purpose. (The Selectmen recommend passage of this article.)

ARTICLE 57. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to dispose of by the most prudent means possible, any equipment, vehicles, furniture or other non-real estate town property that is no longer necessary to town operations. (The Selectmen recommend passage of this article.)

ARTICLE 58. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen, on behalf of the town, to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the town for non-payment of taxes due thereon, on such terms as they deem advisable and to issue quit-claim deeds for such property. (The Selectmen recommend passage of this article.)

ARTICLE 59. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Town Treasurer, after Board of Selectmen approval, to file a waiver of automatic foreclosure at the Registry of Deeds, pursuant to 36 M.R.S.A. § 944, on real estate that may be burdensome for the Town. (The Selectmen recommend passage of this article.)

ARTICLE 60. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the amended Shoreland Zoning Ordinance. Last Amended at Town Meeting August 29, 2020. (The Selectmen recommend passage of this article.)

ARTICLE 61. To see if the Town will vote to repeal and replace the Floodplain Management Ordinance. Last amended at Town Meeting March 12, 2001. (The Selectmen recommend passage of this article.)

ARTICLE 62. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Utility Scale Solar Facilities Moratorium Ordinance. (The Selectmen recommend passage of this article.)

ARTICLE 63. To see if the Town will vote to approve the Annual Report for Tax Year April 1, 2020 through March 31, 2021 for the KVCAP Mary Street Affordable Housing Development District. (The Selectmen recommend passage of this article.)

ARTICLE 64. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to act as the authorized representative of the Town Meeting for the purpose of approving each year's Annual Report for the KVCAP Mary Street Affordable Housing Development District. (The Selectmen recommend passage of this article.)

ARTICLE 65. To see if the Town will vote to approve the Release Deed for Map 23, Lot 52 (Corner of Main Street and West Front Street) to convey said property to the State of Maine. (The Selectmen recommend passage of this article.)

ARTICLE 66. To see if the Town will vote to approve the Option and Park Relocation Agreement with Maine School Administrative District No. 54. (The Selectmen recommend passage of this article.)

ARTICLE 67. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to execute all documents necessary to accept dedications of any easements necessary for the Run of River Whitewater Park. (The Selectmen recommend passage of this article.)


ARTICLE 68. To see if the Town will vote to accept the gift of a twenty-foot-wide sewer easement from Joey P. Joseph (Map 4, Lot 8) to transport sewage from the East Madison Road to the Town's sewer line located under Madison Avenue/ Route 201 with the understanding that the Town of Skowhegan will maintain and repair any pipes, lines and equipment installed by the Town of Skowhegan. (The Selectmen recommend passage of this article.)




You are hereby directed to serve this warrant by posting in a public and conspicuous place at least seven (7) days before the holding of said meeting.




